

The High Awards- the Girl Scout Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards- are leadership awards for Take Action projects that address the root cause of a community issue with a sustainable and measurable solution.


Take Action Projects:

Do you know the difference between a community service project and a Take Action project?

Community Service	Take Action Project
 Addresses an immediate need Done for the community Short term solution Improves the situation for some people right not Sometimes measurable 	 Addresses the root cause of a problem Done with the community, not fo Creates a lasting impact in the community Ensures sustainability long after the Girl Scout's involvement Measurable benefits

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Components of a High Awards Project



- <u>Root Cause</u>- What is the issue and why is it happening? Decide on one root cause of a problem and create a solution to make it better.
- <u>Leadership</u>- Lead the way! How are you working with others, taking responsibility, and accomplishing your goals?
- <u>Volunteers</u>- Get helpers. Who do you know and how can they help you with your project? It is not a leader's job to work alone, but to delegate and ask for help.
- <u>Advocacy</u>- Tell others! How can you teach people about the issue and your project? Think of ways you can educate, inspire, and share your message.
- <u>Sustainable</u>- Create a lasting change and impact beyond your involvement.
- <u>Measurable</u>- Set goals to see how your project is making a difference.
- <u>National/ Global Link</u>- How does your project connect to the bigger issue. Research to see how other communities have tackled the same issue. What did they do and how could it influence your project?

Important Dates

Please note, that projects done at camp or benefitting Girl Scouts require council preapproval. This must be completed prior to starting the project and before submitting their Silver or Gold Award Proposal.

April

Recommended last day for bridging Cadettes and graduating Ambassadors to submit their proposals.

March

All final reports submitted by March 1st are included in that year's ceremony. Submissions after this date will be celebrated in the following year's ceremony.

July Absolute last day for bridging Cadettes and graduating Ambassadors to submit their proposals.

Sept.

GSUSA Deadline! All final reports due for Bronze, Silver, and Gold.

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
