The Mark of the Truly Remarkable

The Girl Scout Gold Award represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting, recognizing girls who demonstrate extraordinary leadership through remarkable Take Action projects that have sustainable impact in their communities and beyond. In 100 years, one million girls have earned the Gold Award or its equivalent. University research indicates that adding the Gold Award to a college application is a critical element in the admissions decision process.

- ▶ According to the 2012 National Girl Scout Alumnae Study, Gold Award Girl Scouts place significantly higher importance on having a successful career and financial security, being leaders, and they are more likely to believe that they are achieving their life's ambitions.
- ▶ A number of colleges and universities recognize the achievements and leadership abilities of Gold Award Girl Scouts by establishing scholarship programs for them. Girl Scouts of the USA publishes the Scholarships for Girl Scouts at girlscouts.org/scholarships and all Gold Award Girl Scouts and their families are strongly encouraged to check it out. Seniors in high school can also apply for a council scholarship.
- ▶ A Girl Scout who has earned her Gold Award immediately rises one rank in any U.S. military branch.
- ▶ Gold Award Girl Scouts are acknowledged by many government, state, local, and non-profit organizations.
- ▶ Girls completing their High Awards at the Bronze, Silver, or Gold levels may apply their service hours to the President's Volunteer Service Awards. For more information, visit presidentialserviceawards.gov.

This scholarship recognizes one outstanding Gold Award Girl Scout per council. The following Girl Scout has been selected because her project exemplifies the core components of the Gold Award, and demonstrates extraordinary leadership to drive lasting change in their community and beyond.







GRACE ALLEN **Pretty Port Pillows**

Grace advocated for those going through chemotherapy by making over 100 port pillows. The ports patients have placed to help with chemo can become irritated by seatbelts and cause infection. The port pillows Grace created provide comfort and help to eliminate that issue by attaching to a seat belt giving a cushion so no infection

or discomfort occurs. Grace shared the video on how to create port pillows with her community and had over 100 and counting pillows made by other people. The project is sustained in numerous ways; the video is uploaded to YouTube for anyone to access. Grace's box at Dr. Cogburn's office at Florida Cancer Specialists directs people to the video each pillow has a web link to Grace's website gsprettyinpink.com. Grace's community also hosts Pretty in Pink every year and will ask for pillows annually to keep donating. Grace is working with Troop 3529 in her community so they can be in charge of the port pillow project and keep it going for years to come. Grace is graduating from Newsome High School in 2022.



MADISON AYERS Meditation Garden at My Warrior's Place

Madison created a Meditation Garden, a peaceful environment for all the brave men and women serving in the military and as first responders, to be able to reflect and relax. My Warrior's Place is a place to support veterans, military, firefighters, and law enforcement, as well as Gold, Blue, and Silver Star families. Sometimes these jobs

can cause stress. Meditation is the ancient practice of gaining clarity through mindfulness. It is also one of the oldest methods to harmonize the mind and body. The Meditation Garden will be sustained by the volunteers and people of My Warrior's Place. OLIVIA BASS Observation Deck at CDT Pioneer Pond

Olivia created an observation deck to teach young girls why it is important to maintain a healthy ecosystem and how to recognize a healthy ecosystem. They can take the information they learned and help others throughout the country learn how to maintain their own ecosystems and keep their environment strong and healthy for

many more generations. The deck at Pioneer Pond is 10x10 feet with programs posted around the deck with QR codes to take the girls to a web page to learn more about animals local to CDT. There is also a QR code guest book for visitors to scan to see how many people have visited the deck. The observation deck will be sustained by Troop 33529, who will replenish the brochures at the library. Olivia graduated from Newsome High School in 2021.





ANN BORDIN Friendship Bridge

Ann's Gold Award addressed the issue of the children's obesity epidemic. The main source of inspiration for this project was that children do not want to play outside and want to play on their phones instead. Ann addressed this by building a bridge for kids to play on at Camp Wai Lani. The Friendship Bridge also doubles as a bridge for

bridging ceremonies, hence the name "Friendship Bridge". The bridge also has a video, a link for public access and will be sustained by Ranger Darryl Behensky at Camp Wai Lani. Ann is graduating from the Academy of The Holy Names in 2022.



KATHERINE BRADBOURNE Green Thumb Girl

Katherine created a curriculum and taught young girls from Kindergarten to 3rd grade about the importance of gardening and sustainability. In the curriculum, there are activities and a lesson plan that explored many of the aspects of growing your own food as it correlates to being healthy. The plants that Katherine showed the girls came

from the garden boxes that were donated to Nancy Lemon with the organization, Girls with Confidence. The project will be sustained by Nancy Lemon, who has included the Green Thumb Girl curriculum as a permanent class that she will teach. Katherine also shared the curriculum with a local Girl Scout Troop to implement. Katherine is graduating from Newsome High School in 2022.



SADIE CAMPBELL (2020-2021 recipient) Type 1, Type What?

Sadie addressed the common misconceptions about Type 1 vs. Type 2 Diabetes focusing on educating youth to alleviate medical bias related to diabetes. Sadie created an in-depth video of how Type 1 diabetes affects the body, presented the video, and held a discussion along with a question and answer session with a 7th-grade class via

Zoom. Additionally, she created an Instagram account @typeonetuesday, posting facts and information about Type 1 diabetes every Tuesday. The project will be sustained through the Instagram page and through the newly established support group for Type 1 diabetic teens called Type One Tuesday. On the first Tuesday of every month, the group meets to discuss various topics that affect a Type 1 diabetic's everyday life. Post-graduation, Sadie's younger brother (who is a Type 1 diabetic) will continue the meetings. Sadie's former middle school science teacher has agreed to present and discuss the video every year. Sadie is graduating from the Academy of The Holy Names in 2022.





HEIDI CLIFF **Identification Cards for Kids**

Heidi's project focused on informing more kids and their parents about the importance of having state-issued identification cards and inspiring them to get one if they don't already have one. Heidi worked to help lower the number of kids that go missing and increase the chances of finding them faster with identification cards to lower

the number of Amber Alerts that go out in a year. Heidi created a video with special guest speakers to emphasize the importance of identification cards for kids. The project will be sustained by the teachers at Heidi's local elementary and middle schools sharing the video along with informational flyers with their classes every year as part of the Great American Teach-In. Heidi graduates from Tarpon Springs High School in 2022.



MIRINA CLINK **Dental Hygiene Bags for Foster Kids**

Mirina's project focused on teaching foster kids proper dental hygiene and the importance of keeping their teeth nice and clean to alleviate future health issues she created cards about dental hygiene to put inside of the bags for the kids to read and distributing a flyer to the parents about the importance of keeping teeth healthy. The

flyers were dropped off at Family Support Services, the local library, and a dentist's office. The project will be sustained by the Pinellas Park High School National Honor Society. Mirina will graduate from Pinellas Park High School in 2022.



EMILY CONNER Astraea Zine Project

Emily's project aimed to amplify the voices of girls around the world who do not have the resources or ability to express and share their experiences. Emily created a platform for anyone women and non-binary people from the ages of 10-21 to share their creativity through works of art and writing. Emily created a beautiful website

with over 2,000 visitors since she began, an Instagram account with over 300 followers, and a team of ten girls who help share and design the zine. The 50-page-long first issue was entitled "Goddess." Emily will continue working to sustain this creative platform for years to come. You can read the current issues or submit work at astraeazine.com. Emily will graduate from St. Petersburg Collegiate High School in 2024.





LINDSEY DAVIS Recycling in Tampa Bay

Lindsey created education about proper recycling and the impact of improper recycling in the Tampa Bay Area to address the lack of education among kids and teens about the state of our environment and the climate crisis. To spread the message she spoke to a middle school biology class; at a local elementary school to first

through third-grade classes, and to her own school's environment club of approximately 30 students. Lindsey helped 4 girls from a local Girl Scout Cadette troop earn their EcoTrekker badge and was given the opportunity to speak about her Gold Award project on WFLA News Channel 8. Lindsey's educational materials can be accessed by anyone through the videos she created and posted on YouTube about recycling guidelines, the importance of proper recycling, and the reasons to advocate for and care about our planet. The project will be sustained by the presentation framework and posters, which were passed on to the leader of the environment club to continue distributing in future years and through the YouTube videos, which remain public and widely accessible. Lindsey is graduating from Tampa Preparatory School in 2022.



OLIVIA DECOSSAS Life Skill Memory Boxes

Olivia addressed the lack of stimulation that the elderly lose from living alone or from not being able to communicate with family members. Over 11 million people provide unpaid care, with little training or tools, to individuals who experience memory loss. She created life skill boxes that contained items related to a theme in someone's life

such as weddings, traveling or gardening. Olivia also created YouTube videos with DIY instructions for caregivers to create the boxes at home. The project will be sustained by Discovery Villages. The boxes were donated to Discovery Villages and will be continuously used by the residents at the memory care facility. She also created a flyer that the facility will send out to the community of Discovery Villages to promote the YouTube videos. Olivia is graduating from Berkeley Preparatory School in 2022.



FARAH ELESSAWY Backyard Composting

Farah addressed pollution by promoting better approaches to reuse things separated from plastics and offer assistance to reduce the sum of trash that goes into landfills, through approaches such as composting kitchen scraps, which benefits nearby and individual home gardens. Farah hosted Zoom meetings to increase awareness of

composting and started a composting site at a nearby school where the community can contribute. The project will be sustained through the website, pamphlets shared in local libraries and a newly established patch program. Farah is graduating from Brooks DeBartolo Collegiate High School in 2022.





CAROLINA FABREGAS Purple Martin Birdhouses

Carolina created Purple Martin birdhouses to control the mosquito population at Camp Dorothy Thomas. Carolina's goal was for the young Girl Scouts at the camp to increase their knowledge about Purple Martins and how they are useful to our environment, thus educating girls about the bird habitats that are being destroyed and how we

can help them. She was able to install a birdhouse with a QR code on the post linked to an educational video explaining birdhouses and Purple Martins. There are four binders in the camp lodge with coloring activities, informational sheets, and more QR codes along with a guest book that will be used to measure results. The project will be sustained by Troop 771. Carolina graduated from Newsome High School in 2021.



ELAINE FEASTER Literacy Awareness

Elaine created a sustainable literacy awareness portal website for adults and children. For adults, it provides information about literacy, how they can help children with reading and resources for the children in their lives. For children, it provides resources for many read-aloud videos and fun learning sites. To promote her website, Elaine

created social media accounts (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram), designed bookmarks for children, made a business card for adults, had a rubber stamp made, and collected books so she could stamp the books before donating them. Elaine collected over 4400 books, all stamped with the rubber stamp with her website address and "Read. Share. Repeat." to encourage others to share the book when finished. She also distributed packets to 34 elementary schools to advocate the importance of literacy where students at the school get together and read. The project will be sustained by the National Honor Society at Freedom High School, 34 Hillsborough County elementary schools, and by the Hillsborough County School Board Members. Elaine is graduating from Freedom High School in 2023.



LINDSEY FLAGG Bridging the Silence

Lindsey installed communication boards in Corr Elementary and Belmont Elementary schools. These boards have pictures and words that are familiar to kids with communication impairments. Lindsey demonstrated to the teachers how these boards can be used and implemented in the classroom to help kids who are non-

verbal. She created an Instagram with information on how to create the communication boards, tips on how to interact with people who are non-verbal, and a comment section for any questions that arise as the general public uses the boards. She also placed flyers in local libraries, schools, and doctor's offices on frequently asked questions about the communication boards and interaction with people who are non-verbal. The project will be sustained by Alison Vallejo, the Speech/Language Pathologist at Corr Elementary who incorporates the communication boards into her therapies to teach students about these important tools for years to come. Lindsey is graduating from Riverview High School in 2022.





ASHLYN GAGNARD Look Out!

Ashlyn created a connection among the population to our local natural treasures by installing an observation deck at Girl Scout Camp Dorothy Thomas and hosted events like viewing the Perseid's Meteor shower to actively get kids into nature. By offering suggestions and events about nature, Ashlyn introduced ideas and concepts about

environmental preservation in a fun and engaging atmosphere. Ashlyn continued the work by creating an informational video about protecting and helping grow the population of Burrowing Owls meant to reach children with no access to local nature spots. In addition to the video, she installed Burrowing Owl habitats and set up talks for the Audubon Society to host at Camp Dorothy Thomas to further children's education of the endangered species. The project will be sustained by the Tampa Audubon Society and Camp Dorothy Thomas. Ashlyn is home-schooled and will be graduating in 2022.



SARAH HOWELL A Change in Scenery

Sarah attends a relatively new high school with very few resources allocated for the theater department. Sarah's project alleviated this by establishing two lesson plans and two Hollywood flats that can be used to teach future students about set design. This will give them real world practice through analytical woodworking skills while

strengthening their ability to focus on, process, and sequence information when building the 4x8 foot Hollywood flats and practice tool safety in the process, while giving the theater department more access for future generations of students. Providing the school with two multi-use set pieces for scenery and also establishing and posting lesson plans and a slideshow to a teacher website as well as a social media platform allows for consistent reference tools for both teachers and students. Sarah will graduate from Cypress Creek High School in 2022.



CASEY INGRAM Library for Little Learners

Casey addressed the and the disparity of student literacy resources among elementary schools. She collected books and hosted a free book fair at Westshore Elementary School right before summer to ensure students would have a minimum of one book to read over the summer. Additionally, she created an Instagram page to educate people

about the issue of illiteracy sharing literacy facts, and a YouTube page with six audiobooks for students to listen to and follow along with the corresponding free e-book. The YouTube videos were shared with the librarian at Westshore Elementary School who passed them on to teachers. The project will be sustained by the National Honor Society at Robinson High School which will host a book drive yearly. Furthermore, the YouTube audiobooks will be available publicly. Casey is graduating from Robinson High School in 2022.





KAITLYN JANSEN **Cardinal Direction Scavenger Hunt**

Kaitlyn created a scavenger hunt that teaches girls how to use a compass and identify and navigate using the cardinal directions. She created a Facebook page to share the educational resources that were used in the scavenger hunt to increase awareness of the project. The scavenger hunt informed the community of the layout of Camp

Dorothy Thomas. The project will be sustained by Kaitlyn's troop and Camp Dorothy Thomas staff. Kaitlyn graduated from Newsome High School in 2021.



EMILY MATLACH Operation Serenity

Emily addressed restricted VA hospital visitation during the COVID-19 global pandemic by collecting items the Lake Nona Hospital needed and donating them on Veterans Day. Operation Serenity promotes a smoother recovery for those in the VA hospital by providing recovering veterans with resources that aim to better their mental state

during their hospital stay. Additionally, Emily's project brings awareness to the struggles that veterans faced while in the VA hospital during the pandemic. Emily was able to donate over 800 items to the VA hospital. She planned, organized, and worked with different groups that are now inspired to continue to donate items to veterans. The project will be sustained by the Students Serving Soldiers Club and the quilting group QGOTV Charities who will make and donate quilts to different VA hospitals all around Florida yearly. They will also donate quilts once a year to the Lake Nona VA hospital. Emily will graduate from West Orange in 2025.



SAMANTHA MCMILLAN Reading for Success Book Cabinet

Samantha addressed the issue of homelessness and low-income families not having access to books to read by putting book cabinets at homeless shelters. One cabinet is at Metropolitan Ministries and the other is located at the Pinellas Hope Homeless Shelter. With the help of the community, Samantha has been able to keep both cabinets filled

with books. The project will be sustained by the Beautiful Waters Service Unit who will host a yearly book drive and deliver the books to both locations. Carol Clark will bring books to Pinellas Hope every two to three months from her community library and Tiffany Butts will collect unsold books at her community yard sales and deliver them to both locations twice a year. Adapt Fresh, Main Street Pharmacy, Traumatic Brain Diagnostics, and Funding4Doctors have all agreed to host book drives. A Pinellas Hope resident and Jennifer Young at Metropolitan Ministries will maintain the book cabinets. Samantha will graduate from J.W. Mitchell High School in 2023.





KENZIE MCMURRAY Tic-Tac-Toe Therapy

Kenzie created Tic-Tac-Toe boards for the memory care unit at Discovery Village in Westchase. As residents and their families play the games and discuss how it helps memory, the family members spread the word about the benefits memory games. Kenzie wanted to tell people about what she learned and how these types of games

and projects can help elderly residents in simple ways. A description of the project was posted in a local magazine, Kenzie posted a YouTube video about the project, posted information on social media, and created a flyer that was provided to Discovery Village. The project will be sustained by Kelsey Ballehr at Discovery Village and through the publicly accessible YouTube video. Kelsey will distribute the flyer to the other facilities in the Assisted Living Facilities network. Kenzie is graduating from Brooks DeBartolo Collegiate High School in 2022.



JULIANA MESSINA **Project Positivity**

Juliana addressed depression, home issues, self-insecurities, bullying, and mental illnesses by creating an Instagram and Wix website. On Instagram, she posted positive affirmations reminding others to celebrate how far they've come if they are going through a hard time, gave ideas on what to do when you are overthinking, and the

difference between toxic positivity and genuine optimism when talking to someone going through a hard time. Juliana's Wix website addresses depression, mental health, and how to spread positivity in your community as well. The project will be sustained by Juliana's sister, Silvana, who took over the project to implement it in her ambassador group at school. Juliana graduated from Cambridge Christian School in 2021.



TATUM MORRIS 12.3 My Home is Drug-Free

Tatum worked to encourage, educate, and empower individuals in her community to make the world a better place. Hosting a local prescription drug take-back day, she collected 25 pounds of medicine from her local community, which effectively motivated citizens to properly dispose of their unwanted, unused, and expired

prescription or over-the-counter medicines. Tatum's audience was educated on the importance of proper disposal of medicines and the dangers of improper disposal. The project will be sustained by the Students Against Destructive Decisions club at her school where she is president of the club this year and will train and assist the underclassman next year, so that when she graduates they will be prepared to sustain the project annually. Tatum is graduating from H.B. Plant High School in 2023.





ELENA MORROW Bring Kids the Stories

Elena's project focused on supporting the needs of the Ronald McDonald House by providing access to books to kids who have to stay for long periods of time due to a family members hospitalization. Elena held a book drive to donate books for the kids to read, along with recordings of the books for kids who might not have strong literary

skills yet, and need someone to help, even if their parents are preoccupied at the hospital. The project is being sustained by the volunteers of Ronald McDonald House. Elena graduated from Gibbs High School in 2021.



MADELINE MURCH Code Camp

Madeline's project aimed to help close the gender gap for women in technology fields by providing engaging STEM activities for young women within the inclusive environment of Girl Scout camp. Girls participated in fun activities, such as coding in Minecraft, coding using drag and drop coding for younger girls, making binary code

bracelets, and playing a game to teach them about algorithms using LEGO Friends. These activities were specifically designed to be more stereotypically girly, and the girls had lots of fun participating in them with their friends. Code Camp is being passed onto INTERA Geosciences Corporation, as well as being sustained by members of Troop 1241. These groups will continue to act as facilitators for Code Camp programming, as well as maintain any necessary computer upkeep and continue to fund the project, should additional funding be required. There are trained facilitators for the project both within Troop 1241 and at INTERA. Madeline graduated from Sunlake High School in 2021.



REMI NOWLAND Boxes of Joy

Remi addressed the lack of activities and materials needed for teens to stay active while they are in the hospitals by creating Boxes of Joy. The boxes focus on skill development; creativity with sketchbooks and origami, writing skills from journaling, and positivity by learning more about themselves and what they can achieve. Remi's

project can be used by other hospitals that see the impact that it has on the teens, allowing for the boxes to reach not only locally but further than Remi imagined. The project will be sustained by Remi's youth group who will continue donating boxes to local hospitals. Remi graduated from Newsome High School in 2021.





NATALIE O'DONOVAN What is Weighing on Your Mind

Natalie's project focused on helping to lower the anxiety that children with autism and ADHD can face every day. Neurodivergent children can experience a sensory overload in classrooms, but accessibility devices like weighted lap pads can help. The weighted lap pads Natalie created will help calm them and maintain their focus. Natalie donated

30 lap pads to three elementary schools: Woodland Elementary, West Zephyrhills Elementary and Sand Pine Elementary School. She also demonstrated to students and teachers how to use them. The project will be sustained by the elementary schools. Natalie is graduating from Zephyrhills High School in 2022.



AURORA OLDMAN A New Beginning- Blessing Baskets

Aurora's project focused on advocacy for women in domestic violence situations, teaching people signs of domestic violence, places to get help such as resource centers, and in her own way helping by giving blessing baskets. The playroom is located at the Resurrection House and allows the

EMILY RIETH Nature to Every Table

Emily's project educated children at a local summer camp about the benefits of eating healthy and helped them start a garden. The garden gave them an excellent way to get involved in making healthy choices and got them to collaborate with other campers who they might not otherwise spend time with, strengthening their sense

of belonging and awareness of others. The gardening program will be sustained by the recreation center and the website will be updated by Emily's friends and family, as they enjoy gardening and healthy eating. Emily is graduating from Alonso High School in 2022.

Maggie's project focused on mental health awareness. Families with a member undergoing medical treatment struggle with many emotions during the process. Sarah created the Fabulously Unique support group to provide a safe place to ask questions, shares success stories, and also to address challenges that come along with having an upper limb difference. She created a Facebook group for members to participate in and a monthly Zoom support group meeting. Fabulously Unique also

received a donation to purchase picture books about limb differences to donate to a local elementary school. The goal of the book donation was to start spreading awareness about limb differences. The school media specialist and the social workers used these books to educate the children about upper limb differences. 




